Research

Once you have chosen the question that you will be investigating for your science fair project, you need to collect information about your topic. This process is called research. You are required to find at least three sources of information. Some of these may include the library, encyclopedias, science books and magazines, your teachers, and the Internet. You may find all three of your sources from the Internet.

The main way to search for information on the Internet is to use a search engine such as Google, Yahoo!, or Bing:

- http://www.google.com
- http://www.yahoo.com
- http://www.bing.com

Finding Information

The easiest way to find information is by "searching" your question or key terms from your question. For example:

- Suppose you are investigating how high tennis balls bounce based on the age of the balls,
- Search: "Do new tennis balls bounce higher than old ones?" or "tennis ball bounce height".
- Click on one of the links, read through the information and write down (in your science fair journal) any related information about tennis balls bouncing.
- Remember to write the title and web address in your journal. You can use these later for your bibliography.

REMEMBER:

- You need at least three sources for your bibliography.
- You CANNOT use Google, Yahoo!, and Bing, as a source for your bibliography. They are search engines and are used to find the websites that will be your source.
- YOU ARE NOT ALLOWED TO USE WIKIPEDIA AS A SOURCE.
